KS1 AT WOODHORN COLLIERY

MINERS FOR A DAY!!

On our recent Key Stage 1 school trip, we visited Woodhorn Colliery Museum to learn about the history of coal mining in our local area. It was an exciting and educational day that gave the children a real insight into what life was like for miners and their families in the past.

As soon as we arrived, we were welcomed by the friendly staff who guided us through the different areas of the museum. The children explored the original colliery buildings, saw the huge winding gear, and even looked inside a real mining cage! We learned about how coal was mined underground and the hard, dangerous work the miners had to do every day. The children particularly enjoyed dressing up in miners' clothes and taking part in a hands-on workshop where they were able to handle and look at artefacts. It helped us understand how much things have changed over time.

Everyone was fascinated by the stories of the miners, and many of the children asked brilliant questions. It was a fantastic opportunity to link what we've been learning in history to the real world.

SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is a special way that Catholics ask God for forgiveness. In this sacrament, people talk to a priest and tell him the things they have done wrong. This helps them say sorry to God and make a fresh start.

When someone goes to Reconciliation, they first think about their sins and feel sorry for them. Then they go to a priest and confess their sins. The priest listens and offers advice. He also gives a penance, which is something the person does to show they are truly sorry — like saying a prayer or doing a kind act.

At the end, the priest says a special prayer called absolution. Through this prayer, God forgives the person's sins. Catholics believe that God's love and mercy are greater than any sin. Reconciliation brings peace to the soul and helps people grow closer to God.

DISCIPLES OF CHRIST

We are delighted to share that our children have recently made their Sacrament of Reconciliation. This special step in their faith journey marks a moment of grace, reflection, and spiritual growth as they experienced God's love and forgiveness in a profound way. We are proud of their openness, preparation, and the support of our community in guiding them through this meaningful sacrament.



FIRST HOLY COMMUNION

First Holy Communion is a special ceremony in the Catholic Church where a person, usually a child, receives the Eucharist for the first time. The Eucharist is considered the body and blood of Jesus Christ, given in the form of bread and wine during Mass. This sacrament is one of the most important steps in a Catholic's journey of faith.

Before receiving First Holy Communion, children attend religious education classes to learn about the meaning of the sacrament, the importance of Mass, and how to receive the Eucharist respectfully. They also go to confession, known as the Sacrament of Reconciliation, to prepare their hearts and souls. This occasion is both a religious milestone and a joyful celebration, marking a deeper participation in the life of the Church.

FIELDWORK FOR EVERYONE

During the course of the week, children across the school have been exploring the local area or their environment through a range of fun and creative activities linked to geography.


EYFS had an exciting opportunity to go on a nature walk to the Rising Sun. As they walked, the children engaged their senses to observe the world around them. They looked carefully at the different types of plants, trees, and flowers they passed by and listened closely to the sounds of birds chirping and leaves rustling in the wind.

KS1 have been making Journey Strings and Sticks during local walks. As they walk, they collect natural items and attach them to their stick or string. Back in school, they use these to retell their journey and talk about what they found.

LKS2 explored the school grounds to create their own sketch maps.

Walking around the school, the children observed key features such as buildings, playgrounds, pathways, and green spaces. They made rough sketches on paper, noting the position of important landmarks. Once back in the classroom, the children refined their

Upper Key Stage 2 are putting together Journey Booklets using a variety of information from their walks. These include things like leaf rubbings, map pieces, data about people and litter, compass directions, and how they felt at each point on their journey.

A DAY OF DISCOVERY!



Living so near to the Coast, we take swimming and water safety very seriously! This is why all pupils receive swimming instruction at some point during their learning journey in Key Stage 2. As part of the national curriculum, we endeavour to ensure that children learn to swim competently, confidently, and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres.

During our swimming sessions, pupils are also taught to use a range of strokes effectively, including front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke. Just as importantly, they learn how to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations, helping them to stay safe and confident around water throughout their lives.




OLYMPIC ATHLETES IN MAKING!


