As always, we continue to exploit every opportunity to enhance our curriculum and this term, children across school have enjoyed a number of specialist weeks as documented in the Beacon. This year we have also introduced Forest School for all pupils and our music offer continues to thrive. As well as Mrs Riley who delivers the children's music lessons, we have a number of children across KS2 accessing additional music lessons in violin, cello, clarinet, keyboard and flute. to promote and be living examples of our schools values.



FOREST SCHOOL


PENCILS AND INK!


During the Spring Term, our Key Stage 1 children had an exciting time at Forest School, where they learned the traditional skills of whittling

RELAX KIDS

A HOLISTIC APPROACH!

This term, our Year 1 children have benefited enormously from a programme called *Relax Kids*. It uses a unique seven-step holistic approach which takes children from high energy and stress levels to a state of relaxation. This is both a physical and mental process involving physical activity, yoga, positive touch, deep breathing exercises and mindfulness techniques.

The aims of the *Relax Kids* programme are to teach our children to learn valuable mindfulness and relaxation tools. This can reduce stress levels and improve focus and concentration. We also hope that is will help them to develop an understanding of the link between physical and mental

health. It also supports children to have a level of understanding of the relationship between the brain,

their feelings and behaviour.













SCIENCE IN LOWER KEY STAGE 2




SKELETONS

In Lower Key Stage 2, children have been exploring the fascinating world of skeletons during their Science lessons. They learned about the three main functions of the skeleton, support, protection, and

movement. They also learnt about how our bones help us stand, shield vital organs, and work with muscles to allow movement.



DANCING IN PE


ST. BERNADETTE'S CHURCH

Next, they developed and learned new steps, rhythms and techniques and focused on choreography, where children practiced their dance sequences and refined

their movements. Finally, they were taught the importance of a cool-down. This involved gentle stretches and reflections on their progress. This approach keeps our lessons engaging, fun, and effective!

EARLY YEARS

UPPER KEY STAGE 2



Bikeability is 'cycling proficiency' for the 21st century, designed to give the our next generation the skills and confidence to ride their bikes on today's roads. Our Year 5 children recently took part in the program, an initiative carefully designed to equip them

with essential cycling skills and road safety awareness. This valuable experience not only enhanced their confidence in riding a bike but also taught them the importance of being responsible and alert while cycling on roads.

Throughout the training, the children progressed through different levels of instruction. They started with basic bike-handling skills in a controlled environment, ensuring they felt comfortable and secure. As they gained confidence, they moved on to more advanced lessons, including how to navigate junctions, signal correctly, and understand road signs.

The program emphasized key safety principles such as wearing helmets, maintaining bike control, and being aware of their surroundings. The instructors provided guidance on how to assess risks and make safe decisions when

cycling, ensuring that the children left the sessions with a strong understanding of how to ride safely and independently.

BIG LENT WALK


FUNDRAISING


