
#### OUR SCHOOL HOUSES














#### ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

St. Francis of Assisi was a very special person who lived a long time ago in Italy,



over 800 years ago! He is known for his love of animals, nature, and helping people. He was born in a town called Assisi, Italy, around the year 1182. Although he was born into a rich family, when he grew up, he decided that he wanted to live a simple life. He wanted to follow Jesus' teachings, helping others and living with nothing but love in his heart.

One of the most famous things about St. Francis is that he loved animals. He believed that all creatures, big and small, were created by God and were his brothers and sisters. There are





Every year, people celebrate St. Francis on October 4th, which is called his Feast Day. On this day, many people bring their pets to church to be blessed in honour of his love for animals.




## MACMILLAN COFFEE MORNING

We would like to thank our whole community for their exceptional generosity of cakes and donations. A special thanks to the Year 6 children for supporting at the


















# SOUP LUNCH — THE PREP!

hard it would have been to survive during the period as they experienced creating their own weapons and hunting for their meals!




Similarly, our LKS2 children welcomed a lady called Kirtida into school, to learn about


# ANTI BULLYING!




## MATHLETES




