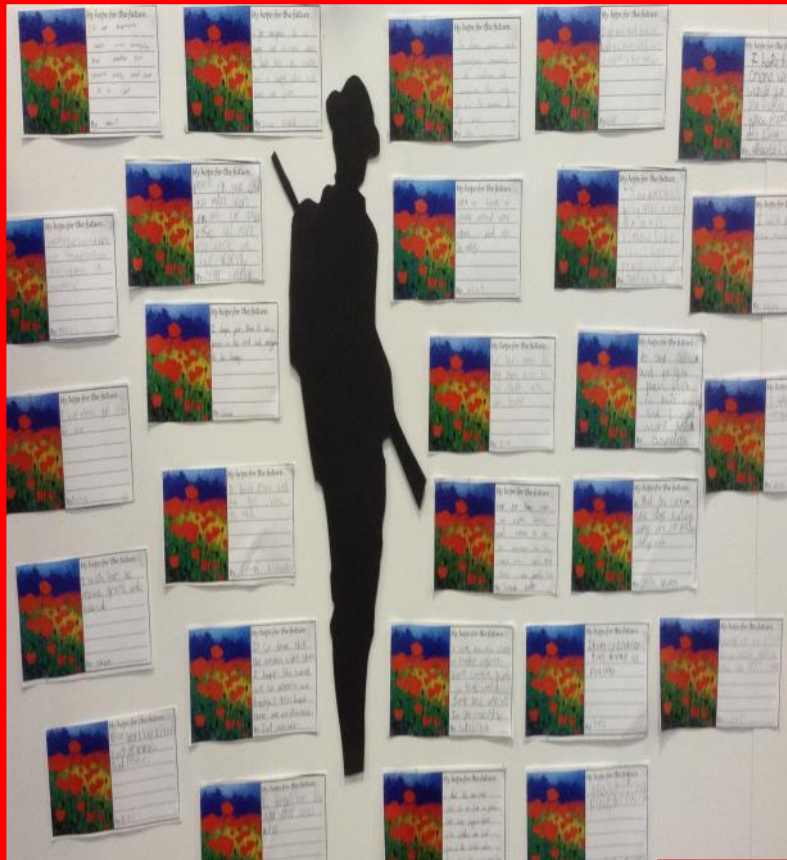

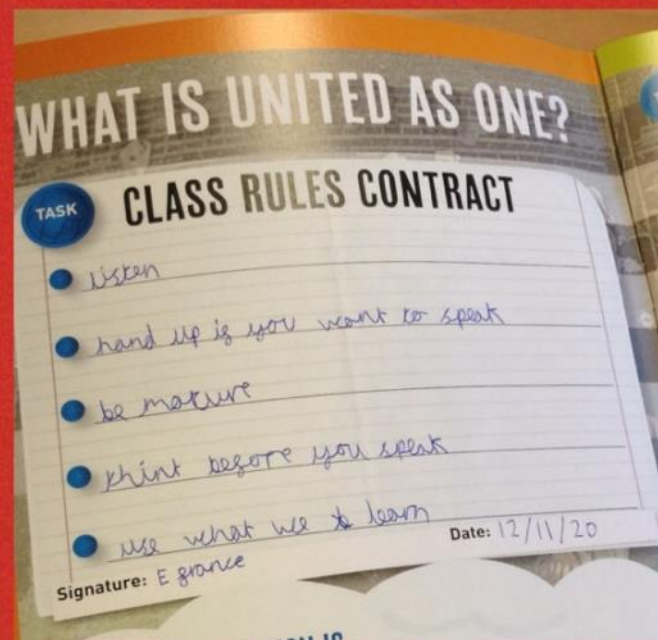
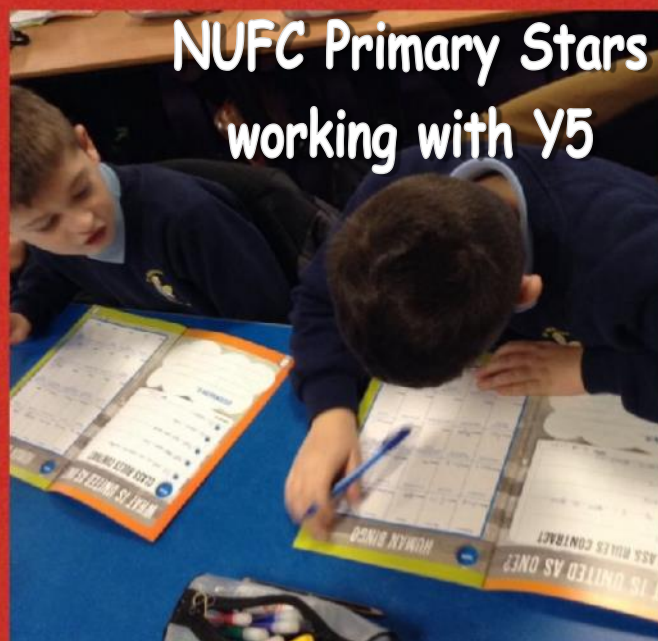
During the first lockdown many, many of our school reading books were sent out to homes for children to use in their Home Learning.

How to Make a Chocolate Roman Road

You will need:

- A small plastic cup
- 1 Plain biscuit
- 2 Maltloaves
- 1 tablespoon of rice crispies
- 1 tablespoon of ready made custard
- 1 Custard Cream biscuit

What to do:

1. Crush the plain biscuit and sprinkle over the bottom of your cup whilst it is covered.
2. Break your maltloaves into pieces and add to the top of the biscuit layer.
3. Next pour a layer of custard over your maltloaves.
4. Crush the rice crispies and form a thick layer on top of the custard.
5. Finally, place the custard cream biscuit over the maltloaves to form the top surface.

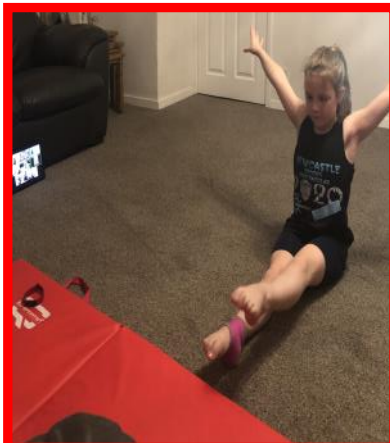
